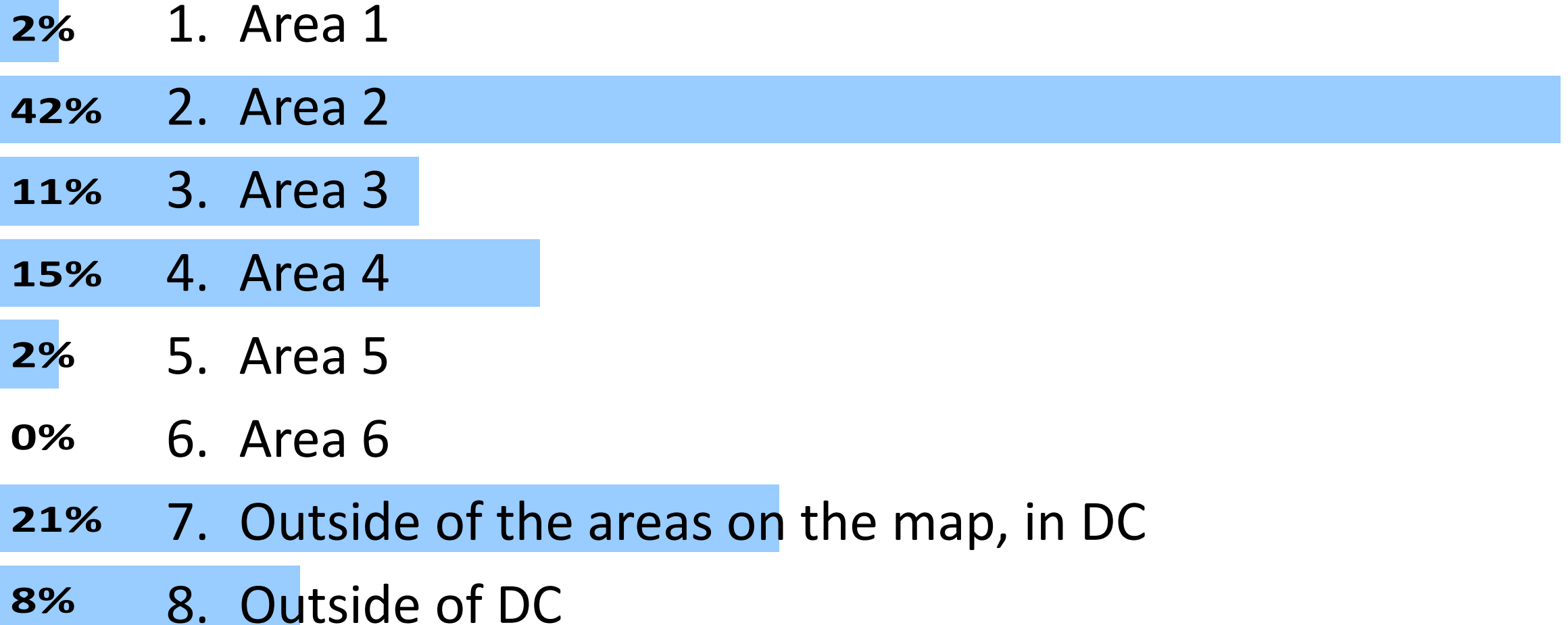

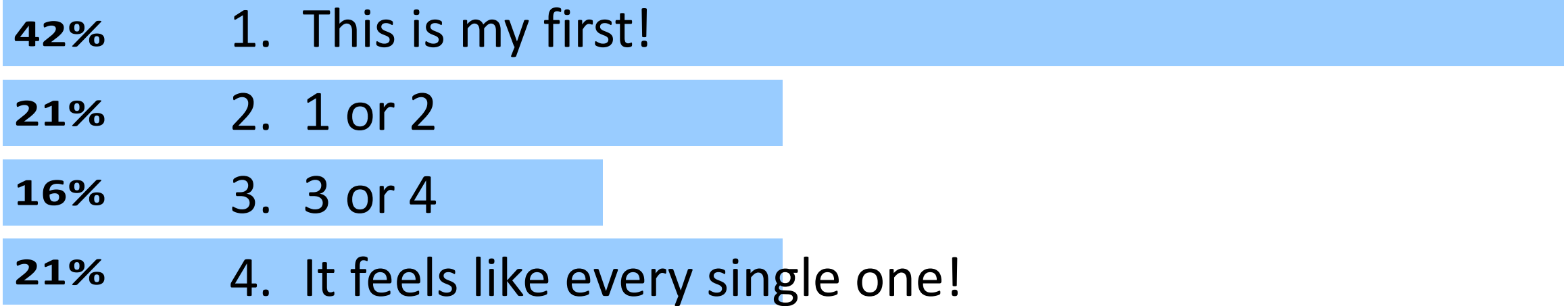
Where do you live in NoMa?




Where do you live in or around NoMa?

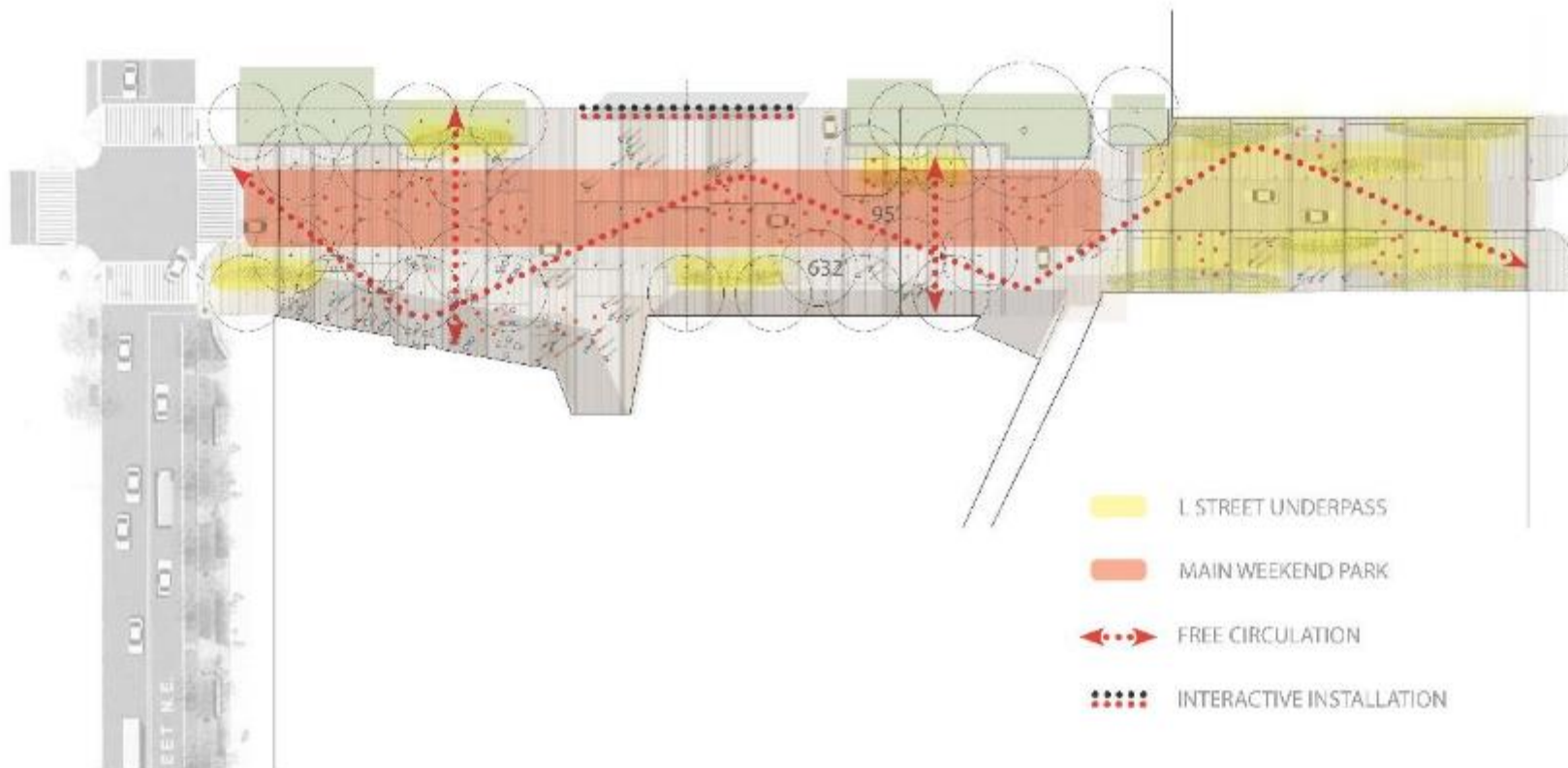


- MBT wayfinding project: Wayfinding signs anticipated to be installed by DDOT in Fall 2018
- Q Street connection and elimination of Z turn will be part of “NoMa Green” construction
- WMATA wall: looking for a solution to rip rap and debris coming onto MBT from rail lines
- Emergency call boxes funded through PUDs
- Light replacements forthcoming
- Mile markers installed
- 3rd Annual Pow!Wow! Murals
- Mural at New York Avenue Bridge abutment
- Other art opportunities

- NPF is seeking another opportunity in the neighborhood to achieve the same goal of providing a neighborhood civic plaza



NoMa Parks Projects – Central Civic Plaza

CENTRAL CIVIC PLAZA CONSIDERATIONS

- Limited amount of grant funds available for a fourth acquisition
- Likely able to acquire site no larger than 10,000 s.f.
- Will leverage opportunities as we did with other acquisitions

CENTRAL CIVIC PLAZA AS PART OF NOMA PARKS PLAN

- The “town square”
- Flexible gathering area for festivals, exhibits, markets, and outdoor dining
- Permanent and occasional seating, possible pavilion area, opportunity for art

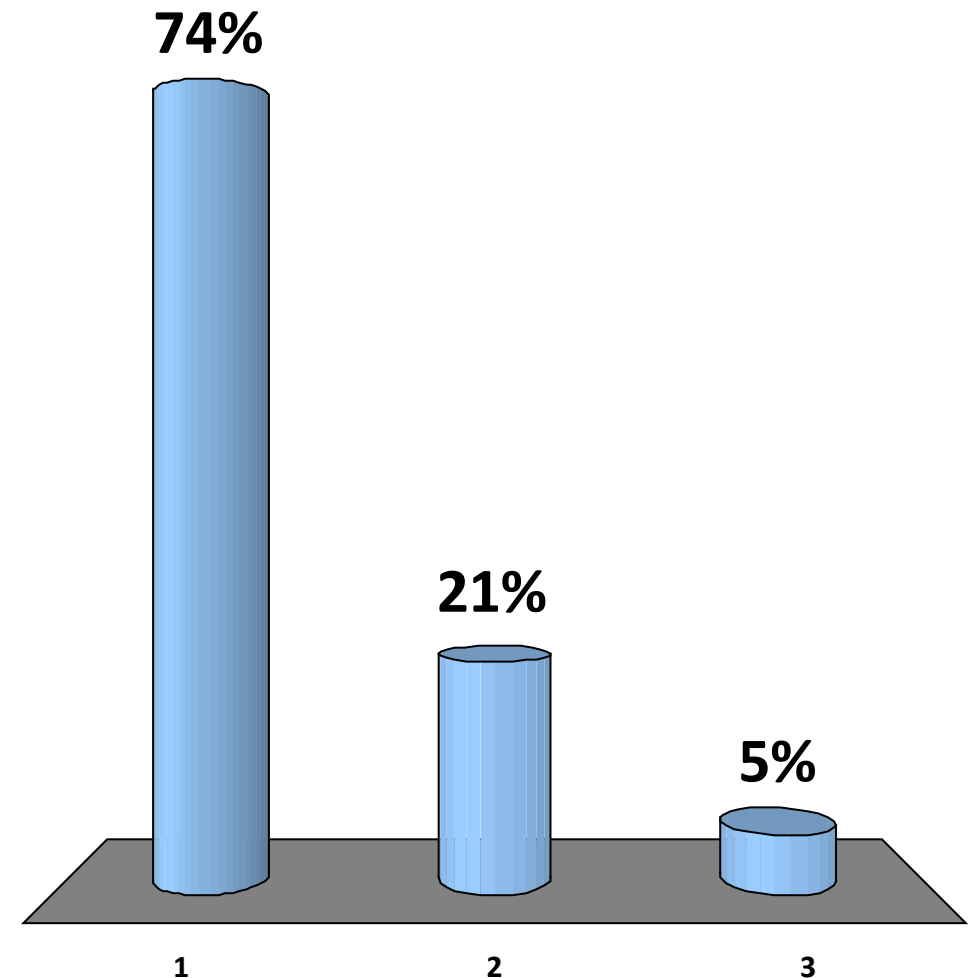

Charred Wood Application (Shou Sugi Ban)
 \ Requires no maintenance for its entire life span.
 \ Acquires a silver sheen over time.
 \ If Vandalized, can be sanded and re-coated with dark oil.
 \ Strength and durability is not compromised if wood and/or char is chipped.
 \ Accoya wood is dimensionally stable and highly resistant to warping, cupping, bowing, shrinking, weathering, and insect infestation.
 \ Class 1 Durability and Requires less fastening points compared to other materials.

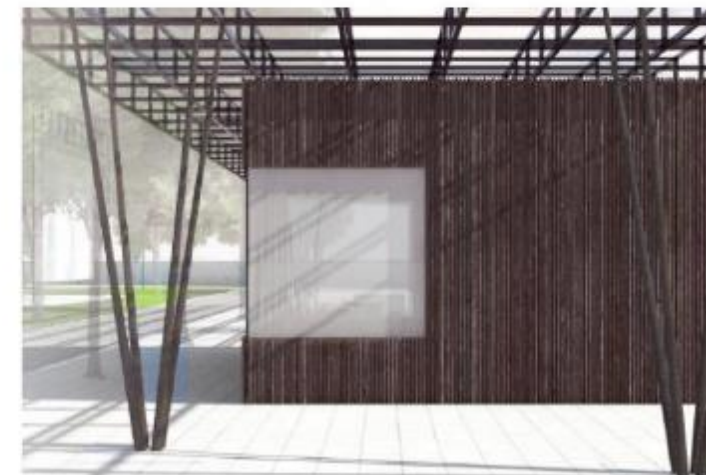

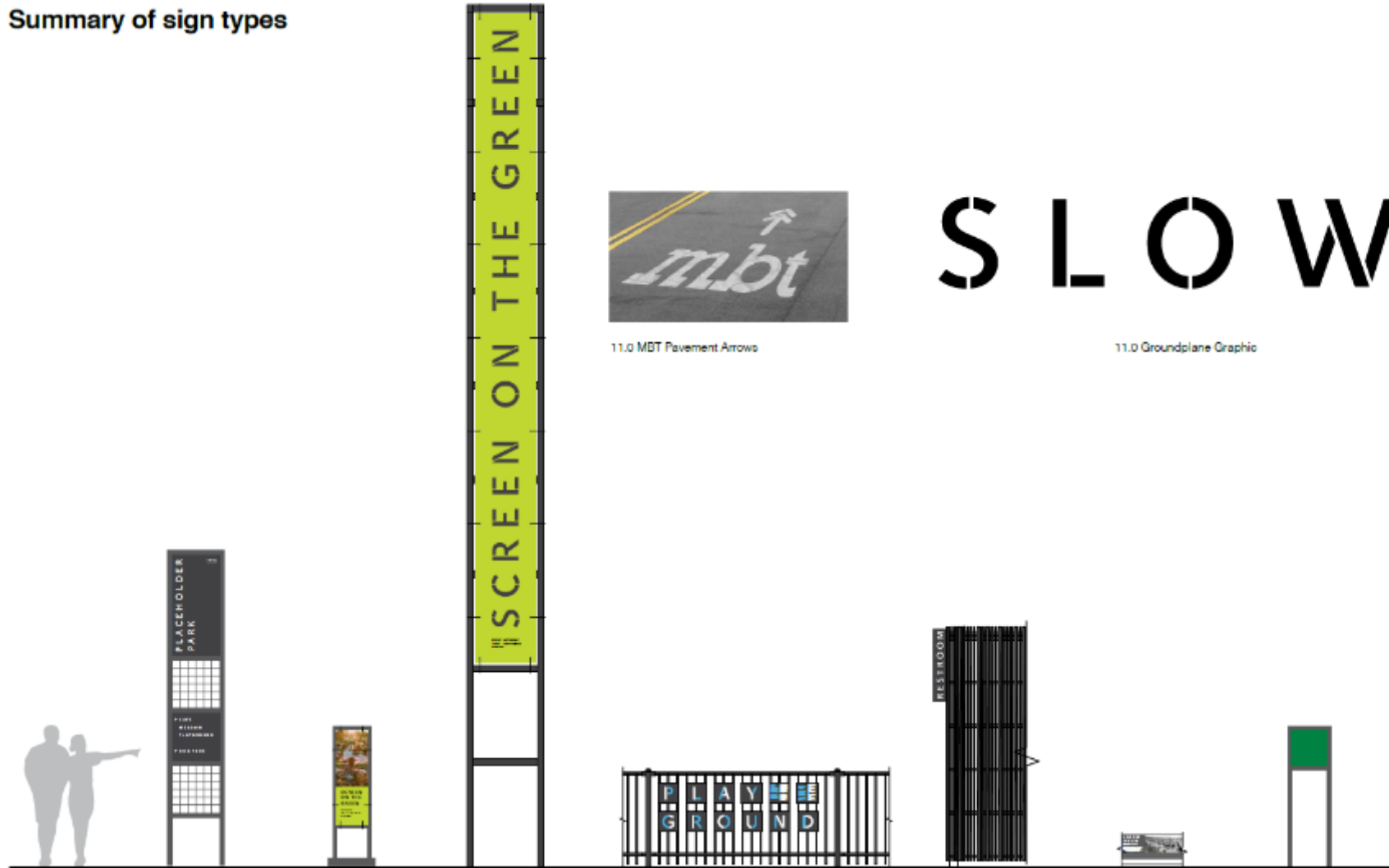

Alethia Browning Tanner

Entrepreneur, Philanthropist

178X - 1864



In the Beginning

- ▶ Born enslaved in late 1700s
- ▶ Born in Prince George's County (Baden, MD)
- ▶ Also known as “Lethe”
- ▶ Widowed, No Children
- ▶ Two Sisters: Sophia Browning Bell and Laurena Browning Cook

Entrepreneur

- ▶ Ran a produce stand in Lafayette Park (“Hired-out slave”)
- ▶ Saved \$1400 to buy her freedom in 1810
- ▶ Saved \$800 to buy freedom for her sister Laurena
 - ▶ Saved \$1500 to buy freedom of her 4 nephews and 1 niece
- ▶ Saved additional monies to purchase other relatives
- ▶ Saved additional monies buy freedom for her neighbors and their children (1836)

Philanthropist

- ▶ Donated funds to start the Bell School, first school for “colored” children in DC (1807)
- ▶ Provide scholarships for relatives to get education
 - ▶ John F. Cook Sr. attended Columbia Institute to study education
- ▶ Bought, with her brother-in-law George Bell, Union Bethel Church building from bank foreclosure
- ▶ Considered the “Mother of the AME Church”

Legacy

- ▶ Laid the foundation for DC institutions
 - ▶ Rev John F. Cook, Sr., nephew, led and expanded Union Seminary
 - ▶ George Cook, grand nephew, was first superintendent of Washington's "Colored Public Schools" (1868-1900)
 - ▶ John F. Cook, Jr., grand nephew, member of Howard University Board of Trustees (1875-1910)
